

# Want to learn about strategies for working with people who use substances? Bring us to your community!



Harm Reduction Learning and Connections (HRLC) is a small group of health care providers and people with lived experience of substance use. We work with communities to share knowledge, skills, and connections with the goal of improving care of people who use substances.

We aim to foster safe, pragmatic, and non-judgmental care for people who use substances by:

1. Facilitating learning about harm reduction for healthcare providers (defined broadly to include social care and support providers),
2. Networking and promoting connections, and
3. Sharing and exchanging knowledge.



WHEN?

- Training sessions will be a full day and take place in person.
- They will occur between April 2023 and March 2024.



WHO?

- This training is designed for health and social care/support providers, and other community members who support and work with people who use substances. All levels of knowledge and experience are welcome!

- Sessions will be facilitated by healthcare providers and people with lived experience of substance use.
- We will focus on sharing practical harm reduction and trauma-informed practice strategies.
- Time for networking, sharing, and connection will be built into each session.
- We aim to help communities build better connections between supports and services.
